**Presentation** Dr. Michael Perry provided the members with an overview of the public dental programs we have here in Sonoma County. He reported that he has served in private practice for forty years and in searching for what was available for the public especially those who are underserved he found that this was more complicated than he imagined. He went on to discuss government programs like Medi-Cal, and Denti-Cal in California. Those who qualify for this program experience difficulty getting access to services due to lack of providers and facilities. Another program in California is Cal-Aim which supplements Denti-Cal, giving Access to Infants and Mothers, another is WIC, however the funding for this program is problematic making some program implementation not possible. In Sonoma County we also have Community Action Partnership of Sonoma (CAPS)/Community Action Network (CAN), this is a non-profit

which implements many great programs like Head Start. They also oversee a program called Give Kids a Smile in collaboration with the Redwood Empire Dental Society. These are the places who are able to take those who qualify for Denti-Cal however they limit the number of patients they will take in a period of time. The reimbursement providers receive for Medi-Cal reimbursement is about one third of what a dentist would be paid in private practice. Which is below the cost of service. With the change of administration in Washington DC, everyone's radar is up. There are six public health dental clinics in Sonoma County, the largest being on Dutton, then the Alexander Valley facility, which is in Cloverdale, the Healdsburg, Windsor facility, the West County facility, which is for Guerneville and Sebastopol, and the Petaluma Health Center for Petaluma and Rohnert Park, and Sonoma Valley. These six facilities are significantly understaffed. Three of the six facilities do not have enough dentists. This is a major issue.

Next Dr. Perry brought up fluoridation of water. This topic has been considered as a political issue for 70 years in the United States. The American Medical Association, The California Dental Association, Sonoma County Board of Health, all strongly recommend public fluoridation of water. It is such an inexpensive way to reduce tooth decay mainly with underserved children. Taking in that systemic fluoride when their teeth are developing strengthens the teeth. There is only one city on Sonoma County that has fluoridation in the water and that is Healdsburg. This had to go through a ballot measure. Santa Rosa's City Council stated that they cannot afford to fluoridate the water. There is a California law that mandates that if there are 10,000 hookups you must fluoridate the water, unless the city is unable to afford it. Another option is to find out how to support the six public health dental clinics, where there is a definite staffing issue. Dr. Perry will send out the data on the programs that exist in Sonoma County, the number of children that have been treated, this has been broken down by ethnicity, literature on fluoride from the California Dental Association, the American Academy of Pediatrics, and includes a link to CAPS/CAN.
